Midway Baptist Church History 1940-2010

Old timers in the late 1930's and early 1940's were saying they had never before witnessed such a moving of the Holy Spirit in the community. People were being saved everywhere; churches, cottage prayer meetings and tent services.



The Rev. Hesikai Liner and his son Harold were tent preachers from the Concord, NC area. They held services in Columbus during the Spring of 1940. Their tent was located on the property of Wash and Ellen Hill, which is now the location of the Mini Mall in Columbus, where Calvert's Restaurant is located. The young Harold was an able assistant to his father. Stories were told of how the older Liner would instruct the son on the finer points of soul winning. He would say, "preach love son, you gotta' preach love, that'll get'm every time, preach love." The story then goes that the older Liner would then proceed to take the pulpit and dish out hellfire and brimstone.

The Liners held services for several weeks and the Lord blessed these services. Many people from the Columbus, Midway, and Mill Spring areas either found the Lord or were reunited.

In the summer of 1940, these new converts and rededicated Christians began to burn with the desire to form their own church. The opening paragraph of Midway's record book reads, "On

June 30, 1940, the Midway Baptist Gospel Tabernacle was originated by a band of 53 members who love the Lord supremely." The following were elected: Trustees- Jim Smith, Roy Jones, Joe Mayes, Andrew Gibbs, Bob Owens; Building Committee- Jim Smith, Roy Jones, Bob Owens, and A.G. Tate. Treasurer of the Building Committee—Robert Owens.

Sunday, July 14, 1940, Midway organized the first Sunday school in the yard of Carrie Ritchey. The following were elected: Sunday School Supt.- Compton Ritchey (also served as song leader); Asst. Sunday School Supt.- Joe Mayes; Secretary/Treasurer- Ralph Gibson.

Sunday, July 21, 1940, ten Sunday School Teachers were elected: Card Class- Connie Tate (Mills), Primary Class- Marie Jones, Junior Girls- Gwendolyn Gibson, Junior Boys- Fred Dameron, Intermediate Girls- Mrs. James McIntyre, Inter-

Sunday, July 28, 1940, Sunday School began with 82 people in attendance. Many were members in good standing of other churches, some were baptized Christians who had never joined a church and some were new converts who had never



spirit could flow through the membership and praise Jesus.

Mr. & Mrs. Arthur Tate donated the land, E.S. Burnette set up a saw mill at the site and the men and women went to work building a church.

During the five month construction period the group held services in Mrs. Carrie Ritchey's open

air yard under the shade trees with the Rev. Harold Liner as Pastor. The group had called Rev. Harold Liner on July 29, 1940, and recommended his home church, West Concord Baptist, ordain him into the Gospel Ministry. The first Baptismal service of the Midway Baptist Gospel Tabernacle was held on July 28, 1940, below Green River dam near the Hwy #9 bridge. The candidates for Baptism were Clyde Covil (Henson), Fred Dameron, Lillian Green, Edith Laughter (Ritchey), and Annie Ruth Laughter (Sims).

Harold was ordained on August 4th and preached his first sermon as Pastor August 11, 1940.

In November of 1940, the first child was born into the Midway Baptist Gospel Tabernacle family this child was

On Sunday, December 1, 1940 the first sermon was preached in the new building by Rev. Harold Liner. Etta Mae Stepp was saved and baptized that day, which according to the church's records was the coldest day of a baptism. This made the members of Midway's dream and goal for the church a reality.

Two weeks later, on December 15, 1940, Rev. Harold Liner resigned as Pastor.

The church then called Rev. Malcolm Ross on December 24, 1940. He also served as Pastor of Big Level Baptist Church and therefore he could only preach alternate Sunday morn-

ings at Midway.

Services continued weekly with the void being filled by a variety of ordained pas-

tors, licensed preachers and lay speakers. Midway continued to grow and became known as a church where "powerful services" were held.

Midway's first Board of Deacons was elected on January 12, 1941 and ordained on March 2, 1941 by the following: Rev. Brock from Spindale, Rev. Bob Earley and Deacons from Peniel, Silver Creek, Beulah, and Tryon Second Baptist. According to the

original minutes, of the church, the first Deacon Board consisted of L.R.Kuykendall, Joe Mayes, Melvin H Covil, Roy Jones and Robert Owens.

On March 9, 1941, Joe Mayes, James Sullivan and Roy Jones came as candidates for Baptism, which was scheduled for March 23rd. Also, the church voted to change the church conferences from the second Sunday morning to the second Wednesday night. The church also voted to have the Lord's Supper every 5th Sunday night. The church name was changed from Midway Baptist Gospel Tabernacle to Midway Baptist Church in the Spring of 1941. July 13, 1941 the church voted to take money out of the Sunday School Treasurer and have the church painted and finished inside. August 13, 1941, the members of the church elected Mr. Melvin Covil as Chairman of Deacons. On

December 14, 1941, just one week after Pearl Harbor, the church voted in favor of having services every Sunday night and to buy a piano.

The year of 1942 proved to be a very active time for the church. In January, the church building was insured for \$2,250.00. In February, the church re-elected Mr. Tate as Sexton (person responsible for the upkeep of the yards and building), the church also purchased land near the church for a cemetery. Shortly after the land was purchased for the cemetery, Deacon Joe Mayes was laid to rest on March 16, 1942; this was the first grave which was dug. May 31st, Midway dedicated it's new building with the Rev. Blythe

as guest speaker and the Rev. Lewis Griswald offering the Dedication prayer.

On June 4th, in a church conference the members voted in favor of paying the

pastor \$10.00 per week. In a church conference on September 13th, the members voted to join the Green River Association. The reading of the first associational letter was presented on September 20th, and accepted by all in attendance. In October, the church appointed Bob Owens to be in charge of purchasing a heater for the church. On October 25th B.W. Reid was ordained as a Minister of the Gospel. At the November 1st church conference, the church elected Katherine Jones as pianist.

As the church continued to grow, the year of 1943 brought about a

time of improvement. In March, the church voted to purchase oil to be put on the floors and benches. Mr. James McEntire volunteered to put the oil on the floor and benches for the cost

of the oil. June 6th the church voted to purchase screens for the windows and doors. At the October 3rd meeting, the church voted to give the Thomasville Orphanage \$5.00 per month. On December 12th at the Church Conference, Clyde Arledge (Henson) was elected Song Leader.

The year of 1944 was a time of spiritual growth for Midway. In March 1944 the church voted to start a singing school with Mrs. Homer as the teacher. Bob Owens a Deacon at Midway was licensed to preach on May 14th and on August 20th, was ordained as a Minister of the Gospel. Also, on August 20th, Midway elected Bob Owens as their pastor.

Midway's love for Christ and His church flowed into the community in the year of 1945. On January 7th, the men of the church built a well box and concrete top for the well of Vinnie

Foster. February 4th, the church voted to build new front door steps and to paint the overhead ceiling white. In March, the church voted to underpin the church with rock and cement. The singing school which was approved in 1944 was started by Mrs. Homer. April 22nd, the church voted to start a Memorial Day on the second Sunday in May. They also voted to buy songbooks for the church.

The year of 1946 was a time of change and expansion for Midway, they decided to change church conferences back to Wednesday evenings. March 4th, church voted in favor of

building Sunday School rooms onto the rear of the church. At the April conference, the church voted to buy materials to construct a table for the Memorial Day Services, which were

being planned. November 27th, the church elected three new Deacons: Lewis Mills, Hugh Hill and Carl Rickman on December 29th, the newly elected Deacons were ordained.

The 1947's continued with growth and general up keep for Midway. In March at the church conference, the members

voted to repair the leaks and raise the janitors salary to \$10.00 per month. In May, the church decided to buy curtains for the church's windows. July 2nd, the church accepted the resignation of Pastor Robert Owens. In August, the church voted to call Rev. Chuck Holbert as Pastor. In September, Rev. Chuck Holbert said by





tember, Rev. Chuck Holbert said he could not accept the position as Pastor, so the church was on the look for a pastor again. During the month of September, it was decided to raise the pastors salary to \$15.00 for part-time and \$20.00 for full-time. September 28, 1947, the church called Rev. Clarence Tucker as Pastor. James Smith and Roy Jones were elected as Deacons on November 9th, both men were already ordained.

The year of 1948 was an exciting time for Midway's congregation as Rev. Tucker continued to preach the Word of God. In March,

Pastor Tucker bought a mat for the church aisle. In April, the church decided to buy church

letterhead for sending out to let former Pastors and members know about the Homecoming Services. The church also purchased a rug for the pulpit area. The first wedding was held at the church on July 31st, when Ophelia Jones was married to Roy Reid. In August, gravel and cinder were placed on the church parking lot. The Sunday School Rooms were finished.

In the year of 1949, dreams became reality for the members of Midway again as they continued to grow and prosper. Janitor salary was raised from \$10.00 a month to \$15.00 a month. The front door was rescreened and screen forms were painted in May. The Sunday School rooms which

were finished in 1949 were dedicated on the first Sunday in August.

The 1950's continued to bring growth, Church voted to build concrete walk at front of the church and to have rock moved and grading to be done near the highway on April 2, 1950.

At the June, 1952 church conference, the church decided to have the wall which is along side of the church built to help with water and erosion. On July 6th, the church approved to buy new church hymnals and the wooden holders to hold the hymnals. In December, the Women's Sunday School Class asked the church to let them move their room closer to the heater for the winter months, this was approved and done. At the December meeting, the church voted to have the floors refinished.

In February, 1953 the church voted to have Mr. Burnette to finish grading around the church. The month of April brought some Spring cleaning and refreshing as the church was painted. As May approached and things were being prepared for Homecoming Services, the church voted

to have the windows and doors repaired and the grounds around the church leveled and spread with gravel. August 2nd, Rev. C. C. Tucker resigned as pastor and Rev. Lewis Griswald was elected.

In January 1954, the church voted to raise the Pastors salary from \$15.00 per week to \$25.00 per week. They also raised the janitors salary from \$15.00 to \$20.00 a month. As summer was in full swing, the church voted to purchase a fan to be placed on the pulpit for the pastor.

On July 22, 1956 the following deacons were ordained: Jack Edwards, Joe Thompson, Earl Cantrell, and John Gibbs.

September 8, 1957 the church accepted Rev. Lewis Griswald's resignation which would be effective on the third Sunday in September. On October 6th, the church voted to elect Rev. Perry Whisenant as Pastor. Also during the 1957 period, new Sunday School rooms were built.

June 22, 1958 the church voted to start a well for water supply to eventually have indoor





plumbing. In August, the pastors salary was raised to \$30.00 per week. August 8th, the church voted to purchase 20 small chairs and a table for the Beginner's Class and to move the current furniture to other classes who needed it. There was a church picnic planned and would be taken advantage of when there was 150 in Sunday School (what a goal). The church also voted to hold choir practice on the 1st and 3rd Saturday nights of each month. In October, the church decided to purchase 24 more new chairs and discussed purchasing a heater for each Sunday School room. In December, the church voted to paint the outside trim work in the Sunday School rooms and Pulpit area inside.

Once again, in 1959 Midway was looking into the future and making plans for the year to come as

the church voted to keep pastors as part-time and to pay them \$35.00 per week. On January 25th, the church voted to keep Pastor Whisenant for 2 more weeks. March 8th, the church voted to erect a new sign. On April 12th the church elected Rev. W.T. Luckadoo as pastor and raised his salary to \$42.50 per week. In August, the church purchased new songbooks for the Junior Choir. In September, the church decided to prepare a budget for the upcoming year.

The 1960's were stable years for Midway, the total membership remained between 145 and 150 people. Business meetings were changed from monthly to quarterly and pastors were no longer required to stand for election annually. At the July meeting, the church voted that when they had \$1000.00 secured to start putting on a new roof. In September, the Pastors salary was

raised to \$65.00 per week. On the 18th of September 1960, E.S. Burnette Jr., Roy Reid and Ray Skipper were elected as deacons, and ordained on October 2, 1960.

In a church conference in 1961, the church decided to have a Watch Night Service which was set for December 31st.

March 4, 1962 the church decided to plant a patch of cane on the piece of extra property and the money raised from the sale of the cane would be put into the building fund. In December, the pastor's salary was raised to \$68.00 per week, and the janitor's pay was also raised.

1963 was a rewarding year for Midway. In February, the church voted to build a utility room and restroom on the back of the church. \$768.00 was reported as being raised from the cane patch and placed in the building fund in March.

In January, 1964 the church voted to purchase blackboards for all the Sunday School Classes. On November 22nd, Rev. W. T. Luckadoo resigned as pastor, effective the last Sunday in November.

March 7, 1965 the church elected Rev. C. C. Tucker as their pastor, this would be the second time that Midway had elected Rev. Tucker as pastor. In April, the choir practice was changed from Saturday nights to Sunday nights. In May, the church voted to purchase carpeting for the church. In December, the church decided to build a new sign for the church, which would be at the road and made out of brick.

In 1966, the church saw many improvements; water trays were purchased to keep down the

dryness in the air, the church was painted on the outside, new coat racks were purchased, weather-board was placed on unfinished part of church, the retaining wall was poured and men's restroom added. Also in December, the church decided to have a Christmas float in the Columbus Christmas Parade.

In January 1967, the church was honored to have won 1^{st} place for the Christmas float which they had entered in the parade. The member's voted to place the prize money of \$25.00 into the Building Fund.

February 4, 1968 Rev. C.C. Tucker gave his resignation, effective the last Sunday of February. On June 16th, Rev. Tom Frady was elected as Pastor. In September, the pastor's salary was raised to \$75.00 per week and the church was able to purchase a piece of land from Mr. Lackey for \$500.00 down and payments of \$100.00 a month until paid.

During the early 70's the church experienced some repairs and additions as the number of members grew. In April 1970, the church was painted on the outside. The church continued to have second Sunday night singings and fellowship times which encouraged the growth of the church. In August 1970, the church approved for Rev. Tom Frady to continue his education at Wake Forest.

At the October 1971 conference, the church voted to add a wheelchair ramp at the backdoor of the church. In December 1972, keeping the theme of the 70's as a time of steady growth, the church voted to raise the insurance of the church from \$15,000.00 to \$25,000.00.


In August 1973, the church went on record as against liquor by

the drink and decided to work hard

to defeat the issue in the November 1973 election.

In 1974, the church voted to paint the outside of the church, several of the men volunteered to paint and to donate paint. The women of the church volunteered to fix them lunch. In July 1974, the church voted to purchase the Coy Painter house for a parsonage for the cost of \$14,000.00. In August, there were two rooms added onto the parsonage.

On April, 11, 1976, Rev. Tom Frady offered his resignation as pastor effective May 16, 1976. On June 27th, Rev. Lawrence Jackson was

elected as Supply Pastor. On June 12, 1977, the church called Rev. Alvin Jackson as their pastor and raised the pastor's salary to \$150.00 per week with extra pay of \$100.00 a week for revivals, Christmas gift and VBS.



election.

As the 70's came to an end, Midway had seen the number of members increase from 151 in 1969 to 183 in 1979. During the 70's Midway had received special blessings and many commitments had been made to continue to grow Midway and to let the Lord have His way in whatever was to come.

As the 1980's began, Midway was full of Spirit and motivation. In August 1980, Pastor Alvin Jackson gave his resignation

which would be effective on August 31, 1980. As 1981 rolled around, the church was still seeking a pastor.

On May 3, 1981, the church elected Rev. Wesley Price as their Pastor. Shortly after being elected as Pastor, Rev. Price not only took on the job of pastor, but also the job of custodian. As the 80's began to take off so did the work on the church. In just a few months, the church had received new siding, roofing, carpeting, new piano and many other improvements with the Rev. Wesley Price as the motivating force.

In May 1983, the church was able to pay off the note which was held by NCNB.

Brotherhood and Baptist Women Organizations were started in June of 1983 with Gene and Suzy Dimsdale as the elected representatives for the groups. On March 4, 1984, the church decided to build a Fellowship Hall connecting to the back of the church and running parallel to the church. On May 23, 1984, the church had quite a surprise as they arrived to find that the ceiling had collapsed in the main sanctuary due to the release of tension from the power pole.

As Midway moved into the mid 80's, the church continued to grow and prosper. In August of 1984, a

After several years of hard work and dedication, Rev. Wesley Price resigned on October 15th, effective November 9, 1986.

November 13th, Rev. Victor Hinson began as a Supply Pastor and on December 28, 1986 was elected as Midway's Pastor.

Victor Hinson as pastor, there were some new classes and programs started and the children of the church continued to be very involved with church activities. In May of 1987, the church was able to purchase a .43 acre piece of land which adjoined the creek for \$3000.00. As the 80's were coming to an end, the church celebrated all that it had accomplished in the previous years with a Note Burning Service on April 2, 1989. The members of the church ended the 80's on a wonderful note by deciding to have a live Nativity scene across the creek to celebrate the birth of the One who had made all things possible for

Midway.

The 1990's started with a dedication and rededication of its members with a challenge made by Rev. Victor Hinson and with an overwhelming altar response. Rev. Victor Hinson resigned as Midway's

pastor on September 12th effective on September 30, 1990.

In October, the church voted to have Rev. Carl Sizemore as a Supply Pastor and then voted him as Pastor on December 16, 1990.

During the early 90's Midway took time to consider the challenge made by Rev. Hinson and to grow in Christ. Midway was able to learn several very important lessons during this time.

During May 1991, the church installed a burglar system after experiencing several break-ins. The Rev. Carl Sizemore resigned as Pastor on November 29, 1992.

In the months after Rev. Sizemore resigned, the church called Rev. Dillard Davidson as Interim Pastor.

Rev. Davidson was a blessing to Midway with all of his years of experience. While Rev. Dillard was interim, the church took the time to review and renew their purpose. Rev. Davidson was very encouraging and supportive to the members of Midway while they were in the search for a Pastor.

On May 2, 1993, the church elected Rev. William Swink as Pastor. During Rev. Swink's ministry at Midway, he brought life and laughter, tears and joy to the folks at Midway. Rev. Swink's reputation in our community was one that everyone came to love and appreciate. The church decided in August 1993 to start a church van fund. A telephone was installed in the fellowship hall in November 1993. During April 1994, the church purchased a van. In November 1994, the church purchased new hymnals.

On March 8, 1995, the church voted to change Homecoming from Mother's Day to the first Sunday in May. April 1995, the church had the van lettered and in June decided to build a double parking shed for the van.

In March 1996, the church voted to start paying for the

Pastor a spot on WJFJ Radio, in Columbus. As the church continued to grow in their love for



each other and their love and appreciation for the Lord Jesus Christ, they decided to "Pursue a Building Program" on August 14, 1996. As 1996 came and went, the discussion of what to build, when and where to build it was the topic of many church conferences. In June 1997, the Church decided to build a deck onto the Parsonage,

while details of the church buildings and necessary steps were being taken.

July 1997- old house was moved by Bill Burnette in preparation for the construction, which was being scheduled to begin soon.

Near the end of 1997, the Church had decided that the best thing to build was a new fellowship hall which could serve as a Sanctuary until the new Sanctuary could be built. The Fellowship Hall which was proposed was to be a 40X70 construction and the men of the church would do the work.

As 1998 began and things were in the works to build a fellowship hall, the Church decided to move

the Building Fund Offering from the fourth Sunday of the month to the first Sunday of the month. At a Church conference in February, the church decided to enlarge the new fellowship hall plans from a 40x70 to a 50x80 building. As Spring began the men of the Church went to work building a fellowship hall.

In March, Rev. William Swink made the church aware of his resignation and his last date as Pastor was March 21, 1999. On April 14, 1999, the church called Rev. Harold Wilson as Interim Pastor and he began on Easter Sunday, with the Sunrise Service.

In May 1999, the church decided to hire an Accountant to handle the finances of the church. The accountant hired was Eugene Mills of Mills Accounting Services. In May, 1999, the church began preparing for Y-2K with some old fashion revival services conducted by Rev. Danny Seigfried.

The members of the church rededicated themselves to the cause of "Winning Souls for Christ".

In June 1999, the church voted to start a "Watch Care Program" for new members.

During the summer months and through September, the men of the church worked very hard on the new fellowship hall. On November 13, 1999, Midway dedicated its New Fellowship Hall with the Rev. William Swink bringing the message and Rev. Harold Wilson asking the Prayer of Dedication. The ceremony was followed by a Ribbon Cutting with the Deacons, Building and Ground Committee, and Pastors as the members looked on. As the church celebrated being debt free, it

had a need for a Pastor. In December 1999, the church decided to start work on the old Fellowship hall soon, turning it into classrooms.

Midway decided to call Rev. Mark Garner for another trial sermon and elected him as Pastor on January 9, 2000. On February 6, 2000 Rev. Mark Garner preached his first sermon as Pastor of Midway. Rev. Garner's first few months at Midway were a time of adjustment and hard work. As Rev. Garner joined Midway as their Pastor, Midway was in full swing of turning the Old Fellowship Hall into Sunday School Classrooms and planning to start construction on a new sanctuary. In March, Midway voted that due to the construction currently going on, that they would have a joint VBS with Columbus Baptist Church.

On May 7, 2000 Midway was blessed to celebrate the 60th Anniversary of the Church with a Homecoming Service

would be the last service to be held in the original sanctuary. Midway took time during this service to thank God for all that He has allowed Midway to accomplish over the years. They also took time to remember all of the hard working, dedicated Christians who over the years has supported Midway with their prayers and efforts. As the congregation looked into the future, they agreed together

to continue to support the efforts of the original 53 Members, who had a dream to be a Lighthouse to a lost and dying world.

In just 6 short, but long months, another dream had become a reality as the completion of the New Sanctuary was complete in November, 2000.

January 20, 2001 was the date the New Sanctuary and education wings were dedicated to the Lord for whatever he had in store next, with a Ribbon Cutting Service. On February 21, 2001 the church voted to donate the old organ to Rock Springs Baptist Church, since the original organ was donated to Midway, and

since Midway had been

blessed with a donation of a new organ by Steve and Dixie Toth, it was the only right thing to do. On September 11, 2001, the country as a whole experienced a terrible awakening with the Terrorist attack on the Twin Towers and the lives of innocent people. The church had a prayer service to pray for the families of those affected by this awful event. The nation as a



whole saw the turning back to God and the community support of each other. Midway took this time to try to bring the community together through starting a recognition service of the fire department, police department, EMS, Veterans and others who serve our community, country and nation. There was a lot of activity in churches of people coming back to the basics

and Midway decided to do the same.

In the year 2002, Midway continued to grow and prosper, due to the Lord's generous blessings. On February 20th, it was voted to clear, grade and gravel 40 additional parking spaces across the creek. The cost for this project would be approximately \$8,000. May 15th, Midway was privileged to be able to recommend that two of its members become Fruitland Bible Institute enrollees. Mike Conner and Joe Foster were the two, recommended. In June, the church voted to add a covered bridge and new sign at the road. After many months of working on projects at the church and building, Midway congregation decided to have a Family Night at Harmon Field to have some time to get to know

each other in a personal relationship and to share the Spirit of love with each other. On September 29, 2002, Rev. Mark Garner announced his resignation, effective October 27, 2002. In Octo-

ber, Mike Conner surrendered to the Call of the Lord on his life to do Full Time Ministry work and was licensed to preach. In November, the church voted to have Rev. Gary Lockee as Interim Pastor. December rolled around just like every other year and Midway was very excited and praising God again, when the financial report was given that showed the church was once again debt free! Praise the Lord!!

In 2003, Rev. Gary Lockee accepted the position of Pastor of Midway Baptist Church and the

church continued to grow and prosper. The church once again was blessed with a donation of \$10,000 from Steve Toth in memory of his wife Dixie and a donation from the Woodmen of the World to purchase a new piano, which they did a Upright Grand. It was a beautiful addition to the new church. As summer approached, Midway voted in June to replace the air units in the old Sunday School Wing and to upgrade the playground for the kids by putting in a ball court, swings, slide and making it a family friendly area. As the church increased in membership and children, it was decided that they needed to look for someone who could plan and assist the Pastor with activities for children/ youth and general membership, so a committee was formed to prepare for this. As Midway entered the year of 2004, they called Mike Conner on February 18, to be the Children/Youth/ Associate Pastor. The additional parking spaces were added and in April, an "Upper Room" was added for the growing Youth group and its additional need for space. The church had several other changes in 2004 as it made a move to become better know in the community and to concentrate more on reaching the lost,

On June 20th the church approved the Policy and Guidelines booklet at the church Business meeting. In August, the church voted to hire a professional cleaning service to take care of the weekly needs of the church. **Yes! God is Faithful!!** September 10th – God allowed Midway to reach another goal with the completion and Dedication of the Family Life Center. What seemed like a dream, that might not come true, God had His

hand on it all the way. There was a construction worker's life lost, man's design plans changed, rocks blasted, tears shed, more money needed, and ladies praying at midnight for the Lord to guide and He did just that! Wow!
